

Dr Jing Huang

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Dr. Huang is a Visiting Professor at Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy of National University of Singapore. He is the author of *Factionalism in Chinese Communist Politics* (2000), which won the prestigious Masayoshi Ohira Memorial Prize; *Crisis and Challenges in US-China Relations, 1989-1993* (Beijing, 2003); and *Inseparable Separation: the Making of China's Taiwan Policy* (2008, forthcoming). He has published numerous articles and book chapters on Chinese elite politics, China's development strategy and foreign policy, the military and its political role, US-China relations, and security issues in the Asian Pacific region. He is now working on two new books: *Civil-Military Relations in China: a Long March towards Institutionalization*, and *Sino-Japanese Relations and the U.S. Approach*.

Before coming to LKYSPP, Dr. Huang was a Visiting Senior Fellow at East Asian Institute of NUS, and a Senior Fellow at the Brookings Institution (2004-2007). At Brookings, he played a major role in the projects of the Trilateral (US-China-Japan) Track II Dialogues, Asian Regionalism, China's Energy Security and Policy, and the US-India China Dialogue. He was a co-leader of the multi-year US-China Crisis Management project (with Michael Swaine of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace and Iain Johnston of Harvard University). Dr. Huang also chaired the Tibet project, and he has developed a close relationship with the Dalai Lama and his special envoy Lodi Gyari. He has frequently advised the Tibetan leaders on international and China affairs.

Dr. Huang is recipient of numerous fellowships and research grants, including the Fulbright Fellowship, the MacArthur Foundation, the Shorentein Fellowship, the Ford Foundation, the Smith Richardson Foundation, the Melon Foundation, the Asian Foundation, the American Philosophical Society, the U.S. Institute of Peace, the Masayoshi Ohira Memorial Foundation, and the Harvard-Yenching fellowship.

Before joining Brookings in 2004, Dr. Huang had been a Shrenstein Fellow at Stanford University (2002-2003), and Director of the Asia Studies Program and an associate professor of political science and (1994-2004) at the Utah State University. He also taught at Harvard University (1993, 1997-98) and was a guest professor at various Chinese and Korean universities. Dr. Huang received his BA (English Literature) from Sichuan University, MA (History) from Fudan University and Ph.D. (Government) from Harvard University.
